To what extent are your strategies	1
Co-Developed with Groups Experiencing Inequities	
 Share and redistribute decision-making power with groups experiencing inequities by redefining roles, valuing different ways of knowing (e.g., lived experience and research), creating more balanced decision-making processes, and holding institutions accountable to using resident voice. 	
 Authentically engage groups experiencing inequities in the strategy co-design process, for example through a co-design workshop. 	
Using a Targeted Universalism Approach	
 Identify which groups are experiencing the most inequities related to your targeted problem and why. 	
 Design strategies to address those groups' specific needs, circumstances, and cultural traditions. 	
Broaden solution to benefit as many people in the community as possible.	
Enhancing Capacity of Groups Experiencing Inequities	
 Design strategies to enhance the social, economic, political, and learning power and capacity of communities experiencing inequities. 	
Leveraging Powerful Root Causes	
 Design strategies to shift powerful root cause leverage points driving local inequities (listed below in order of most to least powerful) 	
 Mindsets Connections, Regulations, Power Interactions and Feedback Components and Resources 	
Addressing Unintended Consequences	
Address potential unintended consequences of your strategies such as:	
 further disadvantaging groups experiencing inequities 	
o relocating the problem or root causes to another community area	
 shifting system resources away from other essential activities

Peer to Peer Consultant Roles

Use a Targeted Universalism Approach

Your role is to help the team use a Targeted Universalism approach to design their strategies. (Refer pages 8-9 of the Design Equity Supplement)

Key Questions to ask:

- How can you design this strategy to address the specific needs, circumstances, and cultural traditions of groups experiencing our targeted inequity?
- What can you then add to the strategy so it benefits as many additional people in the community as possible?

Enhance Capacity of Groups Experiencing Inequities

Your role is to help the team consider how to enhance the power and capacity of groups experiencing inequities.

Key Questions to ask:

 How can you design this strategy to enhance and build the social, economic, political, and learning power and capacity of groups experiencing the targeted inequities?

Anticipating and Addressing Unanticipated Consequences

Your role is to help the team anticipate and address unintended consequences their strategies could have on equity.

Key Questions to ask:

- Could your strategies create any unintended consequences for groups experiencing inequities?
- If so, how can you address these consequences?
